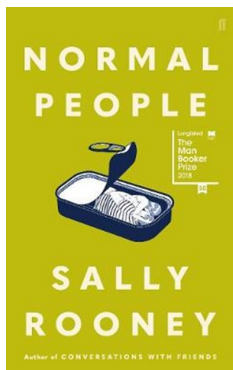

[\*Normal People\*](#) by Sally Rooney

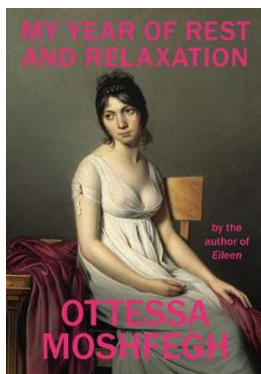
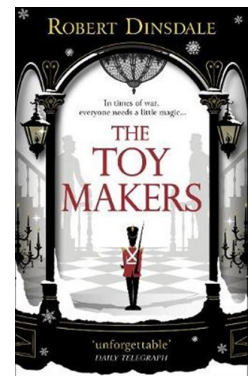

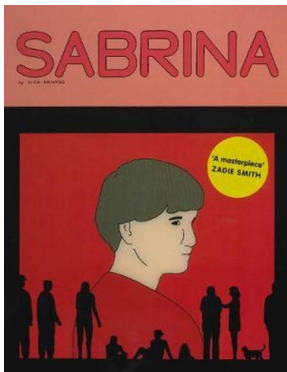


[\*My Year of Rest and Relaxation\*](#) by Ottessa Moshfegh

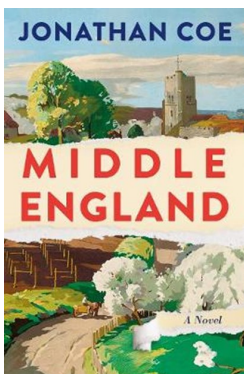
An unnerving, beautifully illustrated book that explores trauma and truth in the digital age.

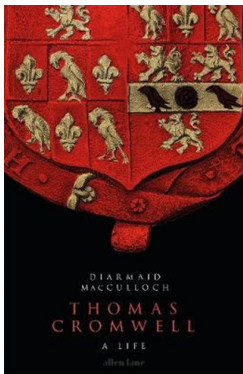


[Middle England](#) by Jonathan Coe

[\*Thomas Cromwell: A Life\*](#) by Diarmaid MacCulloch

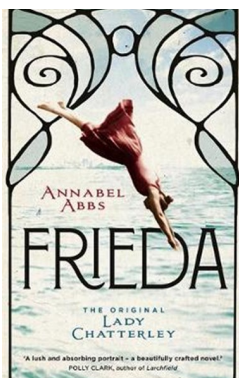
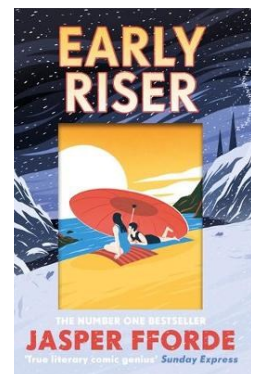
This biography immerses you in a wonderfully detailed account not just of Cromwell's life, but his world. If you loved Hilary Mantel's books, read this.

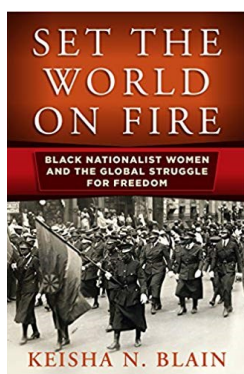


[\*Frieda\*](#) by Annabel Abbs

[\*Set the World on Fire: Black Nationalist Women and the Global Struggle for Freedom\*](#) by Keisha N. Blain

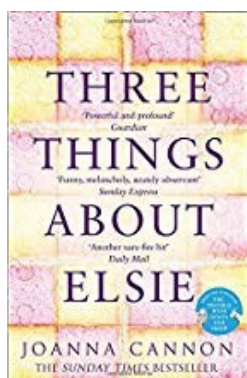
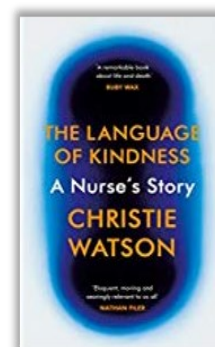

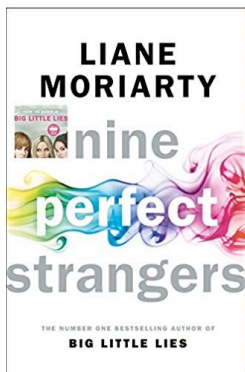


[\*Three Things About Elsie\*](#) by Joanna Cannon

[\*Nine Perfect Strangers\*](#) by Liane Moriarty

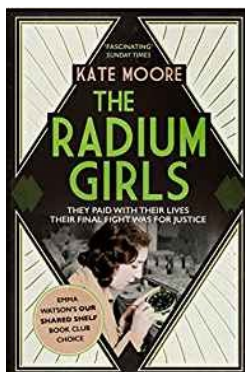
